

Who is AICCU?

- Founded in 1955 to coordinate with the state on the formation of the California Scholarship Program, now known as the Cal Grant Program.
- AICCU serves as the collective voice for the private, nonprofit colleges and universities. All AICCU institutions must be nonprofit, degree granting, and WASC accredited with the main campus located in California.




Who are our colleges & universities?

- As of January 2024, 90 members strong.
- Representing a wide range of institutions – traditional undergraduate programs, liberal arts, specialized, research, faith-based, graduate only.
- Collectively, over 6,000 programs are available.




Located throughout the state

Who are our students?

- In Fall 2022
 - **155,855** Undergraduate Students
 - **13,203** Transfer-in Students
- **63%** of undergraduate students are California residents
- **18%** of undergraduate students are nontraditional learners
- **79%** of students receive institutional, state, local or federal grant aid
- **25,244** Cal Grant students
- Average Student to Faculty ratio is **10:1**



Who are our students cont.

- **48%** of Cal Grant students are First Generation Students
- **78%** of AICCU institutions are Yellow Ribbon Institutions serving US Veterans
- **75%** of AICCU institutions are Hispanic Serving Institutions (HSI) or Emerging HSIs
- Graduate **41%** of teaching credentials, **51%** of nursing degrees, and **91%** clinical/counseling/applied psychology degrees in the state






CCC Transfer Population vs. ADT Admits at AICCU Institutions



Year-over-year Enrollment of ADT Students Admitted to AICCU Institutions







<p>Courses that meet this requirement enhance understanding of citizenship and moral agency in today's increasingly global society by teaching students to identify social, political, economic, and cultural forces that bear on human experience in the U.S. and around the world.</p> <p>EXAMPLES OF ACCEPTABLE COURSES: International Relations, Intro to Peace (or Conflict) Studies</p> <p>NOT ACCEPTABLE: Courses that consider these issues in the context of a single country, like the U.S.</p> <p>..... COURSE OR EXAM</p> <p><input type="checkbox"/> Completed <input type="checkbox"/> At USC <input type="checkbox"/> In progress <input type="checkbox"/> Non-USC</p>	<p>Courses that meet this requirement examine the historical and cultural foundations of contemporary societies over a substantial period of time by teaching students to understand the enduring influence of literary, political, economic, philosophical, legal, ethical and religious traditions.</p> <p>EXAMPLES OF ACCEPTABLE COURSES: Art History (must include cultural context), History of Architecture (must include cultural context), Music History, History of Religion, History of {a particular religion}, History of Theatre, Western Civilization, World Civilization, US History, Old Testament, New Testament, Mythology (Greek/Roman/World)</p> <p>NOT ACCEPTABLE: Intro to Religion (general), Modern or contemporary history courses focused on the 20th century or later.</p> <p>..... ADDITIONAL MAJOR-RELATED COURSES RECOMMENDED OR REQUIRED FOR ADMISSION

In addition to GE requirements, the curricula of many undergraduate majors contain lower-division introductory coursework often available at other institutions. Students wishing to be more competitive in the applicant pool should consider completing the suggested courses listed for their major before transferring. With the exceptions of the USC School of Architecture, Marshall School of Business and the Dental Hygiene program, completion of these courses is not a prerequisite for transfer admission to USC.

Business & Accounting		<p>Required for admission: WRIT 130 (Analytical Writing); MATH 118 (Fundamental Principles of the Calculus) or MATH 125 (Calculus I)</p> <p>These courses must be completed by the end of the spring semester for admission consideration; fall completion is preferred.</p> <p>All upper-division business core courses and major electives must be taken at USC. Business courses completed at another college or university may earn general elective credit.</p> <p>In addition:</p> <p>It is recommended that students complete General Education courses, as well as financial and managerial accounting.</p> <p>Please note that prospective Accounting majors must first enter the Marshall School of Business as Business Administration majors. A formal request to transfer to the Leventhal School of Accounting can be made once the resident accounting course or courses are successfully completed.</p>
